

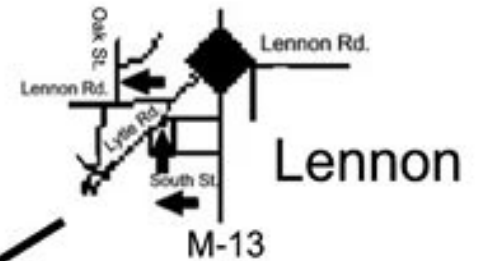
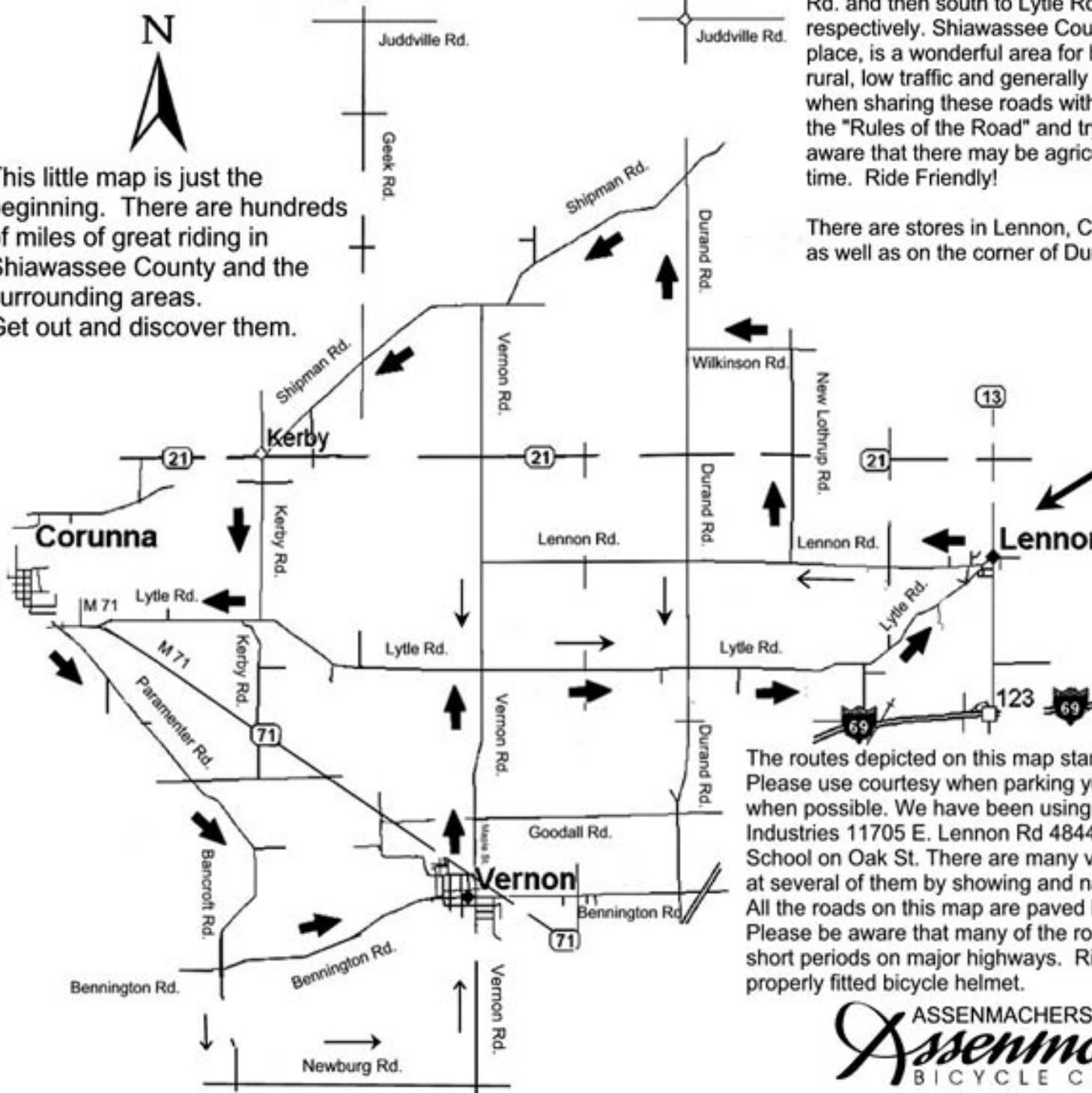
Lennon Bicycle Routes



This little map is just the beginning. There are hundreds of miles of great riding in Shiawassee County and the surrounding areas. Get out and discover them.

The perimeter "long route" depicted in dark arrows is approximately 30 miles. The shorter routes, Lennon Rd. to Durand Rd. or Vernon Rd. and then south to Lytle Rd. and back are 7 and 11 miles long respectively. Shiawassee County, the area where these rides take place, is a wonderful area for bicycle riding. It features easy terrain, rural, low traffic and generally well paved roads. Ride courteously when sharing these roads with motorists and other cyclists. Follow the "Rules of the Road" and try not hold up motorized traffic. Be aware that there may be agricultural equipment on the roads at any time. Ride Friendly!

There are stores in Lennon, Corunna, and Vernon for refreshments as well as on the corner of Durand Rd. and M-21.



Downtown Lennon is located on M-13 about half way between I-69 and M-21. All routes on this map head west from Lennon. M-13 is the county line between Genesee and Shiawassee County.

The routes depicted on this map start and end in Lennon, Michigan. Please use courtesy when parking your vehicle. Use public parking when possible. We have been using the parking lot at the former OK Industries 11705 E. Lennon Rd 48449 and the Doyle Knight Elementary School on Oak St. There are many variations to these routes. I have hinted at several of them by showing and naming some of the connecting roads. All the roads on this map are paved but the conditions can change over time. Please be aware that many of the routes involve crossing or riding for short periods on major highways. Ride smart, use caution and wear a properly fitted bicycle helmet.

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
